Golf Croquet on the Big Island

The Tasmanian Golf Croquet Team returned triumphantly clutching the 6th Place Trophy after competing in the recent Interstate Shield Competition.

The ten person team all played well with little reward on the score sheet ending with 6 matches and 36 games.



The experience has left us with the following questions:

- 1. What is the best way to dry your sodden croquet shoes?
 - a) 1 hour in a fan forced oven at 50°
 - b) Placed in tumble drier at 5.30am !
 - c) Using a hairdryer
- 2. Which female player placed her mallet in the hands of the large Confucius statue in Southbank?

- 5. If the strawberry runs the watermelon hoop is the black grape off side?

Selection Policy

As part of its selection policy, the TCA has revised the criteria used to evaluate player performance for the State Golf Croquet team:

- a competent level of roqueting ability
- a high level of hoop running and ball placement ability
- Ability to consistently play jump shots
- a low percentage of unforced errors in match play
- tactical knowledge in Golf Croquet play
- successful doubles play
- a good knowledge of the Rules
- performance under pressure.

Performance criteria for Association Croquet remain unchanged:

- success rate of triple peeling, including delayed triple peeling,
- a high level of roqueting ability
- a low percentage of unforced errors in match play
- tactical knowledge in advanced play and in pegged out games
- successful doubles play
- a good knowledge of the Laws,
- performance under pressure



Wiring Lifts

There has been some discussion in recent times about when a ball is wired in an impeded swing situation, so Graeme Denehey (Director of Refereeing) provides the following advice:

Law 13 of the Laws Book explains the matter, in particular 13 c and 13 d

 $13 \ c \ 2$ specifies that a ball is wired from another ball if any part of the hoop excluding the jaws or the peg would impede the swing of the mallet before its impact with the relevant ball

13 d then goes on to state that "In law 13 c 2 the swing is impeded if there is any part of the end face of the mallet that the striker used in the turn before the relevant ball was positioned with which he would be unable to strike the centre of the relevant ball in order to drive it freely with his normal swing towards any part of the target ball. However the swing is not impeded merely because a hoop or the peg interferes with the striker's stance

To summarise the most important aspects are:

- The adversary must be responsible for the position of the relevant ball
- The striker must be unable to strike the centre of the relevant ball with any part of the end face of the mallet before making any contact with the hoop or peg. The fact that the striker may not be able to follow through because of the hoop or peg is not relevant
- The referee should conduct the wiring test using the strikers mallet

Coaching

David Wise, Level 2 coach from South Australia has been over in the State for the ACA Handicap Doubles Event, played at St. Leonards. During his week in the State he conducted coaching clinics for interested Golf and Association croquet players. Two sessions were held at Devonport Croquet Club – the first one was so well received and attended by 15 players that David was asked to conduct another session on his return through Devonport a week later – which he did.

The next session was held at St. Leonards Croquet Centre and 15 people attended a Golf Croquet clinic. Five players travelled to Launceston from Hobart and everyone enjoyed a very instructive session, although when it came to a segment on tactics most got a bit lost, since everyone was more keen on running the hoop and taking the chance than playing to the percentage! On Saturday David, assisted by Sue Beattie held an Association session. Fifteen people attended and were taken through a revision of a wide variety of shots where precision was the aim – near enough was not good enough. The programme continued on the Sunday morning with six of the keenest taking part.

Thanks are due to David, for spending so much time coaching in the north of the State, St. Leonards for making the lawn available and the TCA for paying the cost of hiring a lawn. The question of accreditation of coaches is a difficult one. Most players can and will help others, but given that there is a method that has been carefully devised by John Riches, ACA Director of coaching (which enables people to become accredited with the Australian Sports Commission and consequently covered by Insurance, including public liability), anyone wishing to 'coach' should take the trouble to attend a General Sports Principles Course (one day) and follow the Level 1 Coaching Manual. The cost of this is \$80 + \$20 for the Manual, a fee which most Clubs will pay to ensure that they have at least a Level 1 Coach. Sandy Bay C.C. are fortunate to have one member who will be attending the General Sports Principles course at the beginning of November.

The good news is that we will now have a Level 2 Accredited Coach in the State, the first for many years. Sue Beattie has nearly completed the Course, after being assessed by David during his time here and as Coach of the Tassie Association Team hopes to get a coach from the mainland to conduct a course at the beginning of December.

Croquet Etiquette

As a growing sport, croquet has many new players coming to grips with how to play. Playing is not just a matter of shot selection and shot execution, but also of playing within both the rules and the spirit of the game.

Similar to Golf, a croquet player is expected to referee themselves, and you cannot do this if you don't know the rules.

In Golf Croquet, rule 14 is labelled *Etiquette* and says that players are responsible for maintaining good standards of behaviour towards other players, equipment, courts and spectators. It gives examples of unacceptable behaviour that players are expected to avoid including:

- Offers tactical advice to anyone other than their partner
- Interrupts the striker by standing or moving in front of them

- Fails to play with reasonable dispatch. Players are not to waste time.
- Plays after the opponent has clearly asked that play be stopped to enable an action to be investigated
- Provides wrong information to an opponent when asked such things as the score, which ball is to play, and how an offside ball reached its position.
- Fails to accept a decision of a referee on a matter of fact, or shows a lack of respect for a referee.

In Association Croquet, Part 4 of the Rules is labelled Conduct of the Game, and includes the following:

- Rule 47 (b): An opponent is entitled to ask their adversary about the state of the game at any time, and the adversary is obliged to reply to the best of their ability.
- Rule 48(a)(1): Players act as referees of the game in the absence of a referee in charge and thereby incur duties as well as rights.
- Rule 48(b): As a referee of the game the striker must immediately announce any error or interference they believe or suspect they may have committed (as for example a still ball in a fine take-off).
- Rule 48(c)(2): The striker must consult their adversary before playing a questionable stroke without calling a referee (for example, when attempting to roquet a ball in the jaws of a hoop).
- Rule 49(a): The striker must position the balls and play their strokes with reasonable dispatch. The adversary should anticipate as far as possible with which ball they will play next so that they waste no time in approaching it at the start of their turn.
- Rule 50(a): A player is not entitled to receive advice from anyone, except their partner in doubles play.

Northern News

Hopefully by now many of you will have had a chance to visit and play on the new six-lawn complex at St. Leonards in Launceston.

In recent years the North of the state has seen significant growth in membership of its croquet clubs, to the stage where too many people were sharing too few lawns. Many players recognised that more lawns were needed, and thanks to the generosity of the Launceston City Council, and the tireless lobbying of Ian Scott and others, we now have the six lawns prepared for the recent Australian Men's Championships available at St. Leonards.

Moving in Launceston from 2 lawns to 8 has meant much thought and much discussion on how best to utilise and to manage these facilities.

After much discussion, a new club St. Leonards has been set up under President Ian Scott, Vice President Osma Marston, Secretary Bob Godfrey and Treasurer Kaye Jeffery. The club membership continues to grow, and the club has a policy of encouraging competitive play. It has entered teams in all NRCC pennant competitions, and has had early success in local and interstate events.

The club tied on points with Devonport in the NRCC Golf croquet pennants, but finished second on games played. Jan Barnes won the NRCC B-grade handicap tournament, with kaye Jeffery taking out the C-grade. Bob Godfrey tied for second place with Henry Burbury of New Town in the plate event at the recent ACA Men's Golf Croquet Championships. He also, partnered by Russell Kopp of South Australia's Tea Tree Gully club, won a gold medal in the A-division

Association Croquet Doubles at the recent Australian Masters Games held in Adeliade.

The new club, together with the East Launceston Croquet Club, has formed the Northern Tasmanian Croquet Centre (NTCC for short – and apologies to the New Town club!) with the President (Ian Scott) and secretary (Bob Godfrey) coming from the St. Leonard's club, and the Vice President (Lee Turner) and the Treasurer (Trevor Curtis-Flynn) coming from East Launceston.

The Centre is responsible for all aspects of use of the venue, with the St. Leonard's club being responsible just for its members and their affiliation and participation in TCA/NRCC events. Members are still working out demarcation lines. *Senior's Week* was a St. Leonard's club initiative, while the *Active Launceston Expo* was a joint activity by both clubs. *School for Seniors* is an east Launceston activity, but conducted at the St. Leonards facility.

The St. Helens and Devonport clubs have expressed interest in joining the Centre, while the Royal Park club wants to focus on its own site for the time being at least.

The Launceston City Council has provided money in this year's budget to erect clubrooms, and is seeking a top-up grant from the State government. Whether it is an empty shell or fully equipped depends on how far the money can spread, but recent discussions with Council officers leads us to believe we can leave our temporary accommodation early next year.

ACA Handicap Tournament

23 entries were received including representatives from Queensland, Victoria, South Australia and West Australia. This number reduced to 19 due to medical and family problems.

The Doubles, held on 24th and 25th was between ten couples, in two blocks, the winners of both blocks meeting in a final. The winners of block 1 were Bob Beattie and Graham Keating, and of Block 2 were Sue and Mike Bertram. The Bertrams won the final 26/13. We were grateful for Grant Willson stepping in to replace Margaret Brockett who had to pull out due to ill health.

The weather on the Monday was diabolical. Heavy rain in the preceding night gave sodden lawns which were barely playable and the rain continued throughout the day. The two later games were reduced to 2½ hrs. because of the conditions. All players are to be congratulated on persevering in those conditions. The weather on the next day was just the opposite, drying out the lawns early on.

The Singles were intended to be for two Blocks of 10 each. Due to medical and other factors this number reduced to 16, 7 in Block A, 9 in Block B. Again we were grateful to have a substitute, Neil Drury, to boost the number in Block A to give more games to those in that block. All players in Block A went through to the 16 player Knockout, but Ian Scott was eliminated from Block B.

Play was over three days, with three rounds per day. For those without a Bye on the day this proved excessive especially for high handicap players who, without the skill to use their bisques to good effect, rarely made worthwhile breaks and this made for full 3 hour games. I would recommend either reducing the number of games per day to two, or reducing the time for all games to two and a half hours for future handicap Tournaments which, quite rightly, attract a majority of high handicap players.

The Knock-out required two rounds on the Saturday, with the Semi finals and the final on the Sunday. The play off for third place also took place on the Sunday. The final was a very defensive game between Ricki Barrett, the winner, and Tiffany Street, runner up. Graham Keating had a very equal game to beat Alistair Robertson for third place.

A Plate event had been planned to start on the Saturday afternoon for those knocked out in the first round and to continue with those knocked out from the second round on the Sunday morning. In the event this attracted minimal interest as most players claimed exhaustion.

A BBQ was provided on the evening prior to the first day and a very enjoyable Prize Giving dinner in a local hotel on the final night.

We were blessed with a very efficient team of ladies from the two local clubs, St Leonards and East Launceston, who provided a constant source of hot and cold drinks, and delicious hot and cold finger foods to keep the players happy. On some of the less clement days this was a godsend! Kaye Jeffries organised this, and the supply of lunchtime sandwiches. We were indeed very grateful for their efforts.

From reports received from the competitors the tournament was enjoyed by all and we can hope that good words will be spread by those who came from other States.
