Ricki Barratt interviews TCA President lan Smith

This interview which took place in December last year was undertaken for the benefit of new members of Ricki's Sandy Bay club, but should be of interest to new members in all clubs.

R: What IS the TCA?

- I: The TCA is formed of all the affiliated Croquet clubs in Tasmania and therefore consists of all affiliated club members. An executive from representatives of clubs comprising President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and a representative for the northern clubs (NRCC) is elected at the AGM.
- The responsibility of the executive is to run the affairs of the TCA on behalf of its members.
- R: As a member of my club, what does the TCA do for me?
- I: The TCA represents Tasmania at the national level (ACA ... Australian Croquet Association). The ACA provides insurance , organizes national events and provides support for coaching and refereeing.

The TCA, through its sub-committees and nominated conveners such as Director of Coaching, Director of Refereeing, State Handicapper and Competitions Convener, Selection Committees:

- runs competitions such as Pennants, Medals, Tas Open, Hi-lo and ACA Bronze for both Association and Golf croquet;
- organizes some guest coaches from interstate or intrastate, though most coaching is the responsibility of local clubs;
- organizes certification of coaches and referees. It sources Law booklets, referee and coaching materials;
- selects representative State teams.
- R: How may I contribute to the affairs of the TCA?
- I: Attend AGMs and discuss issues with experienced and influential club members and committee members (TCA or Club).
- R: When I enter TCA competitions, where does my entry fee go?
- I: The money goes to clubs for lawn hire and to winners as prize money. The TCA makes no profit out of it.
- R: Will the TCA website give me up-to-date competition results and news of interest such as a member about to compete in an ACA or international event?
- I: Hopefully, yes. The web site is only as good as the information which is given to the web mistress by members and competition conveners.
- R: How can members access the TCA By-Laws and Rules?
- I: These should be on the web site and certainly every club has a copy which should be readily available.
- R: Is there any other information you would like members to know?
- I: At the request of one club (Sandy Bay) it has been agreed that draft minutes of Executive Meetings will be forwarded so that clubs are aware of TCA business. They are draft only in that they are not confirmed until the next meeting.

The TCA is the Croquet Community of Tasmania. It is only as good as the interest shown by its members and the enthusiasm of the few dedicated people who are prepared to give their time and effort on members' behalf.



Nerida Taylor (ACA Executive Director) advises the following:

Players please note that ACA has agreed that for ACA Events, Law 35(b) Ball Jammed in Hoop, will be replaced with Law 53(b)(3). The ACA will include this as a condition in all ACA Events.

Law53(b)(3): If a player suspects that the outcome of a stroke he has just played was affected by a ball being in contact with both uprights of a hoop simultaneously, he is entitled to have the equipment checked and, if necessary, adjusted or replaced. If it is found that the ball does touch both uprights of that hoop on some axis, he may elect to replay the stroke, unless his turn has ended for another reason.

Summary:

If Law 53(b)(3) is advertised in the conditions of the tournament (which will be the case for ACA Events from now on) Law 53(b)(3) replaces Law 35(b). Under this law a player may elect to replay a stroke if his stroke was affected by a ball being in contact with both uprights of a hoop simultaneously – regardless of whether the ball remains jammed in the hoop at the end of the stroke or not.



Time to butt out!

From 1st March this year, it is illegal in Tasmania to smoke within 20 metres of competition, seating or marshalling areas at outdoor sportsgrounds while a sporting event is being conducted. This includes all sporting events, irrespective of the type of ground. It includes the period 30 minutes before and after the sporting event. It does not include informal or impromptu sporting activities.

Referees Decisions

From time to time we will all be faulted by a referee and it is natural to be frustrated when the decision might mean the difference between us winning or losing the game.

At times like these a player is expected to behave properly. Rule 15(c) if the World Croquet Federation *Rules for Golf Croquet* state:

A player may appeal against a referee's application of the Rules but may not appeal against a referee's ruling on a matter of fact. Appeals are to be made to the Tournament Referee.

Similar rules apply in Association Croquet.

Players should accept with good grace any decisions of the referee; if a player is dissatisfied there are proper avenues of appeal. There is no place for intimidation of referees in croquet. Remember, it is easy to be a good winner and at times difficult to be a good loser. It is only a game after all and, win or lose, the sun will still rise the next day.

Tru-Gauge

The Tru-GaugeTM is a rigid piece of plastic with an arc graduated from 3 22/32" to 3 26/32" and is the official ACA hoop gauge.



It has recently been unavailable following the retirement of Orm Cook who manufactured them. Graham Howie and Jim Clement advise that they have been given permission to continue their manufacture and are currently setting up to do so.

Coaching

The ACA Director of Coaching, John Riches from South Australia has resigned the position due to ill-health. During his time as Director of Coaching John has been very active in rewriting the coaching manuals and visiting the States to conduct seminars for both coaches and players. John has attempted to raise the standard of coaching in general and encourage people to undergo some training and also to maintain their skills.

On the local scene it has been encouraging to have been able to register three new Level 1 coaches, Ricki Barrett (Sandy Bay), Ian Smith (Eastern Shore) and Mick Wood (Eastern Shore) and also for the first time in many years Tasmania now has a Level 2 coach - Sue Beattie (Kingston) has completed her assessment and is now registered as a Level 2 coach.

It is not very onerous to become accredited - it involves attending a General Sports Principles course, run by Sport and Rec., obtaining a copy of the Level 1 Coaching Manual from me (\$25) or your Club should have a copy and working through it with a senior coach. When that is done, the State Director of Coaching will register you. Whilst on that subject, most of our current coaches will be due to be re-accredited this year. Seminars will be organised some time during the next few months which coaches will be required to attend is they wish to maintain their accreditation.

In December 2011 Peter Landrebe from NSW came over to conduct a weekend seminar for State Team members, both Association and Golf. Everyone who was able to attend was given plenty to think about in tactics, practice routines and positive thinking!!!
