OUR EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR 2022

Alison Henty reported on a good year for the Club, despite the challenges posed by COVID. Membership is at capacity and the Club is in a strong financial position.

SUCCESSFUL MAYORAL CHALLENGE



The support of local Councils is very important to croquet clubs and the annual Mayoral Challenge, organised by Lee Turner with her NTCC Publicity Committee, is a good way of keeping Councils aware of croquet and the good work it does for the physical and social wellbeing of local communities.

This was the tenth year of the Mayoral Challenge, inviting mayors from the surrounding seven municipalities to a special competition at the NTCC followed by a barbecue. Mayors bring a partner and each team is assigned a mentor to guide their technique and strategy. This year all seven Councils were represented with Northern Midlands taking out the prize.

LAWN CLOSURE

Our last major lawn refurbishment was in 2019, and our lawn consultant, Andy Byard, is suggesting that the lawn again needs scarifying, top dressing, fertilising and resowing to prepare it for the coming season. The work will be done as soon as the soil warms sufficiently – probably late August or early September, and will involve closing the lawn for several weeks.

A new concept in a Golf Croquet Handicap event was trialled by the East Launceston club at the Northern Tasmanian Croquet Centre with 16 members entering the event. In the new format a hoop advantage is allocated instead of free strokes. The handicap system was a great leveler, with the final fought out between Martin Reynolds (handicap 12) and Sue Walker (10), against several entrants with sub five handicaps. Everyone seemed to enjoy the new format, especially Martin.

COVID POLICY

The Club had agreed to act as host club for the TCA Open Doubles Tournament to be held at the NTCC in July. Later we heard that the TCA had changed their COVID protocols and has now accepted an entry from an unvaccinated player who had a medical exemption from wearing a mask.

As researchers have demonstrated that unvaccinated people increase the risk of COVID-19 for everyone when they mix with vaccinated individuals, the Club executive decided that asking our members to coordinate the event would pose an unacceptable risk to a highly vulnerable senior group.

The committee therefore decided to withdraw East's offer to organise the event.
